The EAGLE CATCHER

Native American Indians, to prove themselves worthy of becoming a warrior, had to catch an eagle and bring him back to the Chief. Eagles are known to make their nests at the highest peaks and sometimes even on the sides of a cliff. In order to catch the eagle, an Indian would have to scale the cliffs and climb the rocky terrain to get to the nest. Once there he would grab the eagle by his legs and try to bring him down the rocks. The eagle in an effort to escape would take his huge talons and grasp hold of the Indian's arm. The eagle's talons would often not only penetrate the skin and muscle but would also go straight into the bone. Even with the terrible pain the eagle was inflicting on the Indian, the Indian would not let go of his grasp or the eagle would go free. He knew that he had to bring the eagle down. His desire to become a warrior was far greater than the pain of the eagle's talons. Exhausted, bleeding, and in excruciating pain, the Indian would bring the eagle back to the Chief and the tribe thus proving that he was ready to become a warrior.

This ceremony is an example of determination and singleness of purpose. Being able to focus on the goal will allow you to overcome any obstacles you may encounter. Because of this, the story of the *EAGLE CATCHER* has been told by Dr. Holt and incorporated in his many talks and lectures all across the country.

Dr. Holt has for years had a fondness for the eagle. Over the years he has amassed quite a collection of eagles in various forms. One of his most prized is a pewter statue named the *EAGLE CATCHER* by Michael A. Boyett. Chilmark cast these in 1982 and a total of 1500 were produced. In 1989, Dr. Holt had the opportunity to meet Mr. Boyett and have his statue signed by the artist.

Since the *EAGLE CATCHER* is out of production, and only available through private collectors, Dr. Holt commissioned an artist to hand craft an *EAGLE CATCHER* lapel pin. This pin was hand carved to the likeness of the *EAGLE CATCHER* in his personal collection. It is cast in 14K gold and will be worn by the Holts as they travel in search of their *EAGLE CATCHERS*. At ForYou's annual Gala, in addition to the 1% Cash Leadership Bonus, the winner of the *EAGLE CATCHER AWARD* will receive this uniquely commissioned lapel pin.
